

Honors Team Coordinator Eddy Sauers



US Army PFC James Leonard, Korean War KIA, was brought home Sunday January 21st. PFC Leonard was Killed In Action just 5 days After arriving in Korea in 1950. Found during construction, his remains were identified and returned to his family. PFC Leonard will be reunited with his parents at the family plot on Tuesday January 23rd.

"The Quickest Way" by Kim Crumb

The first motorcycle my late dad, Chauncey "Dutch" Crumb owned, was a Harley Davidson Sport Twin he built in 1924 from a pair of wrecked bikes. Raised on a small ranch in rural Montana, at fifteen he was mechanically inclined, and had the use of the garage one of his older brothers, Marion, owned and operated. Marion, an Army veteran of the fighting in France during The Great War, rode Excelsior and Indian motorcycles. My uncle Bob, another older brother who worked at the garage, rode Harleys. You might say that motorbikes ran in the family.

A photo I have of the Sport Twin shows a nearly flat front tire. At the time, tubes were hard to find and relatively expensive. Ever resourceful, in order to get the running bike on the road, my dad stuffed one ragged tire inside a better one. Inserted in this a tightly wound old blanket served as a tube. The 'tire' was then mounted and he went riding.

Among the various garage vehicles, a Harley sidecar rig was used to carry tools and parts for repairing stranded vehicles on site. The rig was also used to pick up and drop off customers. My dad learned to ride both motorbikes and drive the sidecar. His brothers trusted him enough to ferry customers while their vehicles were being serviced or repaired.

During the depression my dad made several runs on his various Harleys from Montana to Los Angeles. Work was scarce in Montana and he stayed with his sister and brother-in-law (a railroad engineer) while he found jobs, sending money home and saving what he could.

In September of '40 he joined the Army Air Corps. In time he became a Staff Sergeant with the Army Air Corp's 2nd Photographic Mapping Squadron. At one point the squadron was stationed at an airfield in Alaska during the Battle of the Aleutians.

The airfield consisted of a long runway bulldozed out of the relatively level but rocky terrain. Set back at each side, wooden hangers and smaller structures were placed at various points so that one bomb wouldn't take out everything. At intervals flanking the runway a series of long three foot wide trenches had been dug for taking cover in case of an attack by Japanese aircraft. Two inch by twelve inch planks were placed here and there to allow easy crossing of the trenches by foot traffic and the occasional loaded wheelbarrow.

My dad, one of only a few of the men in the squadron who could ride a motorcycle, happened to be on guard duty one evening when a captain rushed up to him. Pointing to the sidecar rig parked by the wooden building, he ordered, "Sergeant Crumb, get me to the hangers on the far side of the airfield as quickly as possible!"

Any of you who have served in the military know that when an enlisted man is given a command, he follows the order to the very best of his ability. An experienced enlisted man will often make certain that the officer receives the most bang for his buck. Or more.

"Yes sir!" My dad replied as the captain leaped into the sidecar.

Between the runway and the building where my dad stood guard, a trench ran a good twenty yards or so in either direction.

Sergeant Crumb kicked the bike to life. Spinning the rig around he headed for the hangers the captain had indicated, which were directly across the runway. When the officer suddenly realized that they were fast approaching the trench, he quickly suggested that they go the long way around.

"No problem, sir." My dad replied. But instead of making a sharp turn for the far end of the trench, he deftly brought the sidecar into the air. The bike's tires thumped across the plank, the car dropped back down. They raced across the runway, making a second plank crossing with the side car and passenger again safely in the air. Moments later the rig slid to a stop next to the hanger.

My dad quickly dismounted, stepped away from the rig, and saluted. "Sir, here we are. As quickly as possible, as requested."

Though somewhat shaken, the captain thanked my dad for the ride.

Oddly enough, the officer turned down the offer of a ride back when he'd finished his business.

Sunday and ride to Napa or Petaluma to get something to eat then go for a ride afterwards. Would like to see more of you join us on these rides. ~Campy








