If you need a ride to any of the meetings or events, please give me a call to arrange for someone to pick you up and bring you home.





I particularly enjoy including the youth and families in our programs.





#### Born Leaders or Forged Leaders

#### Attributes and qualities of an effective leader

There have been events since my childhood where I have asked myself this similar question; why "leaders" people in charge are not actuating positive change of the wrongdoings to others or just apathy of getting involved in our society. These observations were quite clear to me that the effectiveness of their leadership resulted in the lack of fruits.

So, I ask what kinds of fruit people expect from a leader. Rotten fruits, distasteful and bitter fruits or do we expect plump, ripe and sweet fruits that enrich

our lives and bring a sort of palate of excitement to our lives? This is the base for an effective leader. – Their fruits.

An effective leader is one who has been tested in the heat of times, the challenges of life and not wavering to public opinion. One who can listen to the concerns of those within and outside his or her ranks? The leader who can be slow to anger discerning the story between the stories; not reading into things without a full understanding of situations. A successful leader is one who displays humility knowing that he/she is capable of failure and must accept that responsibility by adapting and learning from it.

At times the leader should be able to recognize that he/she alone cannot effect positive change unless he knows the strengths and weaknesses of his/her team. Knowing how to use and delegate your responsibilities helps to fortify the entire cause and team and together effect the positive changes we are looking for.

#### What keeps people from becoming effective leaders?

People are not inherently leaders; leaders emerge when there is a void in events and situations that warrant the interference from an individual who is determined with purpose to step up and make that conscientious choice to effect a positive change.

Leaders who seek self-gratification and self-grandeur with no regards for people or society in general are incapable of being effective leaders. Their inability to carefully listen and pay attention to situations around them can jeopardize organizations thus ineffective to the community they serve in. These types of individuals may not even understand or can see their ineffectiveness unless the governing body presents their observations and make the case to replace them with those who truly have the desire and capabilities to properly and effectively lead. If this is not done, then we are considered enablers to this type of behavior thus reflecting poorly on our leadership.

The current governing leadership should build leaders as in Iron sharpens Iron, effective leadership is part of an ongoing commitment to mentor potential leaders to be effective in their duties. These potential leaders must have the training, tools and channels to communicate their ideas and proposed decisions. A leader can become ineffective when they are left alone to make decisions without having accountability to those above them.

Same goes for leaders who are incapable of properly communicating across all channels up and down the ranks. These attributes will more than likely contribute to the ineffectiveness of a leader.

The American Legion College truly laid the foundation for such a path in becoming a truly effective and focused leader. I urge everyone to take part in this five day classroom environment and gain the understanding for effective real change in your community and in your organization.

Potter's Field at Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery

#### "Santa Rosa ceremony honors unknown veterans buried in county cemetery"

Seventeen new markers were placed Saturday on the graves of military veterans buried at the Sonoma County indigent cemetery in Santa Rosa.

Two Sonoma County residents worked together to identify the veterans in the cemetery, where the county has laid to rest people who die without resources to cover the costs of interment and, often, without known family. As **Sandy Frary**, an archivist and lover of local history, worked on helping the Coroner's Office upgrade its records for the cemetery, **Ron Collier**, a retired Windsor fire chief, jumped on board to help. Collier, who is part of the Missing in America Project, wants to help make sure that all military veterans are honored. "In retirement, Ron has made it his mission, his life's mission, to honor all veterans the way they should be — with honor, with dignity," said state **Senator Mike McGuire**, who spoke at the memorial service and dedication Saturday.

Collier and his Missing in America Project volunteers had hoped to exhume the remains of the veterans and reinter them with full military honors at a national cemetery. However, the cost and logistics of moving the veterans' remains proved daunting, so the Veterans Administration paid to have markers instead. Saturday's honors included a rifle volley and the playing of taps.

The 3-acre county cemetery, commonly known as the Potter's Field, is behind the city-owned Santa Rosa Rural Cemetery at McDonald Avenue and Terrace Way.

#### **Pearl Harbor Commemoration at the USS Hornet**



**Bill Nay**, ALR VP rode with the Warrior Watch riders to the commemoration of Pearl Harbor held on the USS Hornet. The featured speaker was **Lawson Sakai**. Bill presented Lawson with a Chapter 111 coin.

Lawson Sakai was born in Los Angeles on October 27, 1923. In March 1943, enlistment opportunities opened up for Japanese Americans to serve in a segregated unit. Lawson immediately volunteered for 442nd Regimental Combat Team. He was overseas in May 1944 until November 1945. While overseas, he served in all of the 442nd campaigns in Italy and France, including the liberation of Bruyeres, France, and the rescue of the Lost Battalion where he was seriously injured. During the war he was wounded four times, and received a Bronze Star, a Purple Heart and a Combat Infantryman Badge.




