# **ALR President Ron Krudop**



Saturday morning June 15th the Petaluma Elks Lodge celebrated Flag Day at Walnut Park in Petaluma. This year the story of our flag touched me so much that I wanted to share the story with my fellow veterans and sons. The Stars and Stripes, Flag of the United States of America. The world-wide hope of all who, under God, would be free to live & do His will. Upon its folds is written the story of America - the epic of the mightiest & noblest in all history.

In the days when people of the old world groveled in abject homage to the heresy of "the divine right of Kings," a new constellation appeared in the western skies, the Stars & Stripes, symbolizing the divine right of all to life, liberty, happiness and peace under endowment by their Creator. That immortal story is written in blood & sweat, in heroic deeds & unremitting toil, in clearing the primeval forests

& in planting of the vast prairies where once the coyote & buffalo roamed. Onward swept the nation, spanning wide rivers, leaping vast mountain ranges, leaving in its path villages & farms, factories &cities, till at last this giant nation stood astride the continent, from the Atlantic to the Pacific. This is the heritage of the people of the United States. It has been repurchased by each succeeding generation and must be re-won again, again & again until the end of time, lest it to shall pass like the ancient Empire of Greece & Rome. The price of liberty is eternal vigilance. What was won at Lexington & Concord & Bunker Hill had to be repurchased at Ticonderoga & Yorktown. What John Paul Jones achieved upon the high seas in the War of Independence had to be repurchased by Commodore Perry on Lake Erie in the War of 1812. The prestige of Admiral Dewey's victory at Manila Bay in 1898 was re-won by the naval battles in the sea's about the far-distant inlands of the Pacific, after the sneak attack upon Pearl Harbor & Manila in 1941 had summoned our country to assume its role in World War II. What our troops achieved under the Stars & Stripes at Chateau -Thierry & Flanders in World War I, their sons were required to repurchase in World War II in the bloody trek across northern Africa, on the beachheads of Europe & in the Battle of the Bulge. The Flag our American men raised at Iwo Jima was the same Flag later raised in the defense of Inchon, Pusan & Pork Chop Hill in far off Korea. Then another generation under the same Flag bled to stem the threat of communism in far-off Vet Nam. Our young people were again called to carry our Flag in the defense of a free world in the actions in Grenada & Panama. Willingly, our brave men & women carried our Flag & the honor of the American people into battle in Operation Desert Storm. And who among us will forget the sight of firefighters raising our Flag over the ruins of the World Trade Center, the military personnel draping our Flag on the side of the Pentagon, or the citizens of Somerset County, Pennsylvania, placing our Flag near the site where brave Americans died fighting the hijacker of Fight No. 93? No other symbol could offered such comfort, as we still, today, endure the horrors of that day. The resurgence of patriotism since September 11, 2001, has rekindled respect for our Flag, Today we see the Star Spangled Banner wherever we turn, on homes, businesses, and automobiles. Such displays stimulate our love for our nation and for what it stands; they remind us of the sacrifices being made by the men and women of our Armed forces around the world; and they are a tribute to the heroes of the Police and Fire Departments the nation over. What is the meaning of the Flag of the United States? There can never be a definitive answer to that question. But reference to these & similar views of the Flag was resolved by Woodrow Wilson when he said: "This Flag, which we honor & under which we serve, is the emblem of unity, our power, our thought & shape of this nation. It has no other character than that which we give it from generation to generation. The choices are ours. " ~Ron



### **Darrel Shumard Memorial**

June 8, 2019

Members of the Sotoyome Honors Team performed honors at the Santa Rosa Veterans Memorial Building. Shumard died April 7 at the age of 97.

The native of Illinois went into the U.S. Army Air Corps following Imperial Japan's attack on American forces on and near Oahu. He trained to fly the Republic P-47 Thunderbolt. On Valentine's Day of 1945 he was flying over Germany on his second mission of the day when a collision with a second U.S. plane caused him to bail out before his P-47 crashed. He was a prisoner of war until liberation shortly before the surrender of Nazi Germany. Shumard continued to fly as a civilian until shortly before his death. He was a prominent member of the Santa Rosa-based Pacific Coast Air Museum, and was cheered at many gatherings of combat veterans.


